COVID Public Health Emergency (PHE) Status	Economic Support (ES)	The next target date for the 60-day notice of the Public Health Emergency (PHE) ending is mid-November for a January end date. Following the end of the PHE, a number of policy waivers implemented for income maintenance (IM) programs during the pandemic will be rolled back over the following 12 months. The Department of Health Services (DHS) is calling this 12-month rollback period the 'Unwinding'. Some of the most important impacts to IM programs following the PHE ending include: • Ending of the Emergency Food Share allotments. During the PHE, eligible households have received the maximum monthly Food Share benefits for their family size. Following the end of the PHE, these emergency Food Share benefits will end. Households will receive an amount of Food Share calculated based on their family size and income. • Eligibility Reviews & Health Care terminations. During the PHE, eligibility renewals were suspended, and the only reason an individual's healthcare coverage could be ended was upon the member's request, death or if the individual moved out of state. Once the PHE ends the eligibility reviews will resume and will be staggered over a 12-month period to balance workload. 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		 Health Care premium payments reinstituted. During the PHE, health care premiums were suspended. Following the PHE, impacted members will again be required to make monthly premium payments to retain health care coverage. Reinstitution of Drug Testing Requirements. During the PHE, drug testing requirements for members who were convicted of a drug felony in the past five years was suspended. Following the PHE, drug testing requirements will apply to all new FoodShare applicants who have had a drug felony conviction within the last five years. Existing FoodShare members who had the drug testing waived at their initial application during the PHE will be required to complete Drug testing at their next review. Student Eligibility exemptions removed. During the PHE, specific exemptions were created to allow certain students to become eligible for FoodShare. Following the PHE, these specific exemptions for student eligibility will be removed and student eligibility policy will be reinstated.
