MPO 101

Importance of MPOs

- Ensures transportation investment and planning is efficient, data-driven, reflective of local needs and national priorities, while addressing broader regional challenges.
- Based on a Continuing, Cooperative, and Comprehensive (3 Cs) framework
 - Local control with regional reach
 - Solving regional problems through collaboration
 - Responsible use of federal funds
 - Economic development
 - Safety and resiliency
 - Transparency and public input
 - Adapting to the future

Anatomy of an MPO

- Develop core documents that shape regional transportation planning (MTP, UPWP, TIP, etc.)
- Typically include:
 - Elected Board
 - MPO Staff
 - Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)
 - Subcommittee/Working Groups (i.e., CTAT)
 - Citizen Advisory Committees (CAC)

TMA vs. Non-TMA MPO

- MPOs are designated for urbanized areas with a population above 50,000
- TMAs (Transportation Management Areas) are specifically designated for populations 200,000 or more
 - Additional requirements includes Congestion Management, portion of STBG funds suballocated based on pop., and federal certification every 5 years

Reauthorization 101

- The Surface Transportation Reauthorization (e.g. MAP-21, FAST, and IIJA) sets the funding and policy framework for surface transportations programs over a multi-year period.
 - These larger surface transportation funding reauthorizations shape how funding is directed through streams like our PL, STBG, CRP, and TA programs.
- Reauthorization is a key opportunity to shape the polices and funding frameworks that directly impact our communities.
 - For example, MPOs can build relationships with congressional offices to demonstrate how federal transportation polices have impacted our region's projects and communities.

2024 (Ongoing)

Meetings & Hearings in Committees

Initial discussions and hearings are taking place in key committees like the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee and the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

November 5, 2024

Congress & Presidential Election

The results of these elections will influence the leadership and direction of the reauthorization process. The newly elected leaders will set priorities and shape the legislative agenda, which is crucial for the reauthorization of the transportation bill.

January 3, 2025

House & Senate in Session

Members of congress take office, shaping the reauthorization process in the new session.

Leadership on key committees will be important as they will drive the discussions, prioritize issues, and guide the reauthorization through various legislative hurdles



January 20, 2025 Inauguration Day

The President's administration, including the Office of Management and Budget and USDOT, will play a key role in shaping transportation policies. The administration's stance on infrastructure funding and priorities will significantly impact the reauthorization process.



Mid 2025

Committee markups and amendments; stakeholder engagement intensifies.

Committees refine the bills through markups and amendments. Stakeholder engagement, including input from AMPO, becomes more intense to ensure MPOs' priorities are considered. The leadership of these committees will influence which amendments are accepted and how the bill evolves.

Early 2025

Drafting & introduction of bills the House & Senate.

Lawmakers begin drafting the reauthorization bills, incorporating feedback from various stakeholders. The election year and potential turnover of staff may affect timelines.

Late 2025-Early 2026

Floor votes in the House & Senate; reconciliation between the chambers.

Both chambers vote on their versions of the bill, followed by reconciliation of any differences.

Before September 30, 2026 Final Passage

The current IIJA bill expires on September 30, 2025, making it critical to pass a new reauthorization bill. The reauthorization bill must be passed by both chambers and signed into law by the President.

Post-Signing (Ongoing) Implementation

Federal agencies will issue guidance for the execution of the new transportation bill. The administration will oversee this implementation, ensuring the new policies and funding directives are effectively communicated and executed.

The Role of MPOs in the Reauthorization Process

MPOs play a vital role in translating federal policies into regional plans and projects. MPOs ensure that local governments and communities have a say in how those funds are spent.

During reauthorization, MPOs can:

- Build relationships with Congressional offices
 - Demonstrate how federal transportation policies directly impact your region's projects and communities.
- Participate in national coalitions
 - Work with organizations like AMPO to strengthen advocacy efforts.
- Share data-driven stories
 - Highlight successful projects funded by federal programs like STBG to show the real-world impact of federal investments.
- Develop policy priorities
 - Identify and communicate both regional needs and broader MPO priorities, such as increased planning funds, reduced local match, and more direct access to federal dollars.



Federal Funding 101

Planning Formula Funds

Planning Funds (PL/5303):

 These formula funds support MPO planning activities and are allocated to all MPOs based on population and other factors. They fund transportation studies, staff, and long-range planning efforts.

Capital Formula Funds

Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG):

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ):

Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside:

> Carbon Reduction Program (CRP):

- Funds support road, bridge, and multimodal projects. In areas with populations over 200,000 (i.e., Transportation Management Areas or TMAs), a portion is directly suballocated to MPOs. For smaller MPOs, the state determines the funding allocation.
- This program funds projects aimed at reducing transportation-related emissions. CMAQ funds are suballocated to TMAs, while in smaller regions they are often administered by the state. Not all MPOs receive; based on Air Quality and/or agreement with State DOT.
- Funds projects focused on improving non-motorized transportation options, such as bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure. TA funds are suballocated in TMAs, with administration varying in smaller regions.
- Funds projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions from transportation. Like other programs, CRP is suballocated to TMAs, and is often state-administered in smaller areas.

- 1. US Congress authorizes & appropriates funds
- 2. Highway Trust Fund (HFT) as a funding source primarily fed. gas tax & transportation fees
 - 3. Funds flow to State DOTs based on federal apportionments
- 4. MPOs receive suballocated funds
- 5. MPOs program funds into UPWP, TIP, and MTP

Federal Funding 101

- Most federal funds require a local match, typically 20% for PL funds and 80% federal / 20% local split for most programs
- Importance of Participation:
 - MPOs offer a powerful platform for decision making
 - MPO board members translate community priorities into regional action and investments
 - Federal reauthorization and transportation funding decisions are <u>heavily</u> influenced by local elected officials advocacy is key!

Legislative Priorities for MPOs

1. Increase Federal Planning (PL) Funds

- Increased PL funds = smarter investments
- Planning is the foundation of successful projects
- Current planning funds are insufficient, representing less than 1% of total formula funding

2. Reduce Local Match Requirements

- Ensuring access to federal funds
- Lowering barriers to local participation
- Balancing critical local priorities

3. Shift Certain Discretionary Funds to Formula-Based Programs

- Reliable and predictable funding is key
- More efficient project delivery

4. Direct Recipient Status for Certain Federal Funds

- Strengthening local control
- Faster, more responsible planning and project delivery

5. Allow the Carryover of Federal Funds

- · Maximizes the use of federal dollars
- Flexibility for smarter investments

These priorities empower MPOs to deliver better, more impactful transportation solutions.



Key Messages

- Strengthening the MPO process
 - MPOs and decision-making authority over federal funds: Congress designed federal transportation funding to be allocated in part through MPOs (PL, STBG, CMAQ, CRP), ensuring local and regional priorities guide investment decisions. However, administrative barriers often limit or delay MPO control over project selection and funding obligations
 - Stable, dedicated funding is essential for MPO success: Predictable, long-term, direct funding is the foundation of successful MPO-led planning and implementation. Without stable formula funding, regional governments are left in a cycle of inconsistent and unreliable financing.
 - Locally driven investments: MPOs are designed to have authority of project selection, ensuring investments reflect local and regional needs. But too often, that authority is sidestepped. Strengthening MPO decision-making leads to greater transparency, accountability, and effectiveness.

Importance of MPOs:

- ✓ MPOs are the first step in project execution
- ✓ MPOs ensure strategic, regional coordination
- ✓ MPOs break down silos
- ✓ MPOs are best positioned for regional solutions
- ✓ MPOs align transportation investments with local and national priorities
- ✓ MPOs convene key stakeholders
- ✓ MPOs conduct data-driven, long-term planning

What are MPOs?

As **required by Federal law**, MPOs are **regional policy-making bodies** charged with developing and coordinating multimodal transportation plans based on Congressionally created performance measures.

Why are MPOs important?

You wouldn't build a house without a blueprint – so why build a regional transportation network, critical to economic success, without a plan? MPOs develop these blueprints using data-driven processes and extensive stakeholder engagement to ensure investments are targeted, responsive to local needs, aligned with national priorities, and future-proofing.
