1. Does the school have any policies related to walking or biking? Safe Routes to School language has been incorporated into all school district wellness policies with the exception of the School District of Bangor and the School District of Holmen. Holmen has a dedicated website page that lists their Safe Routes to School policies for each school within the district. Schools participating in the Safe Routes to School mini-grant program are encouraged to include and/or update walking and biking information along with Walking School Bus information in parent/student handbooks.

Notes:

2. Safe Routes to School activities target Kindergarten-8th grade schools, but some demographic information may include Pre-K.

- 3. When possible, walk/bike estimates are reported using Classroom Travel Surveys. If surveys are not available, schools/district are asked for estimates.
- 4. When school population totals and Free and Reduce percentages were not provided, <u>www.NCES.ed.gov</u> was used to obtain the information.
- 5. Safe Routes to School staff will work with schools to collect missing or unknown data once the school enlists in the Safe Routes to School program.
- 6. *Holmen school district does not have a set distance for bus eligibility currently. Many of their schools walk to schools' walk to school zones are shaped by UHT Zones instead (i.e. highways).
- 7. **Onalaska only tracks transportation data for students who apply for transportation. The data provided in the table above for Onalaska Middle and High schools is not representative of the total student population.

2024 Agency Management Support & Overhead/Indirect Cost Plan

In order to accurately account for all department costs, LCHD developed an overhead/indirect cost plan, *now called AMSO*, to further capture the costs of administering the department operations. Included within this plan, are the costs to staff LCHD's Administration/Operations section, in addition to the costs associated with being an employee of the LCHD. Costs are calculated using actual expenses as they occur each month, by dividing the total monthly administrative overhead (wages and ops) costs, by the calculated actual # of FTEs worked for that month, arriving at the monthly AMSO cost per FTE. Each employee's monthly AMSO cost is then allocated to each program worked, as reported within LCHD's monthly time reporting application called Health Time Tracker. Below is a list of the budgeted administrative, operating, and shared costs for 2023 included within LCHD's AMSO plan.

Attachment 3 - Narrative

1. La Crosse County Health Department (LCHD) staff have collaborated with schools, municipalities, community members, and agencies to implement a county-wide non-infrastructure SRTS program since 2007. The project application funds will be used to continue/expand the La Crosse County SRTS program, using the 6 E's Framework: *Equity* is an overarching focus for all SRTS activities to ensure individuals of all demographics and identities benefit from the program. Staff will work with partners to assess the need for adaptable materials/resources, helmets, bike locks, scooters, & other opportunities to reduce barriers & make SRTS activities more accessible. Engagement- La Crosse County elementary and middle schools are invited to participate in the SRTS mini grant program. Future SRTS funds will be used to expand SRTS to high school students. Staff will distribute surveys and host focus groups to spark interest and encourage engagement of high school students. Staff will continue to sit on various committees to bring up infrastructure concerns around schools that are brought forward by community members. Encouragement- Staff will continue to work with partners to identify ways to generate enthusiasm for SRTS activities. For the mini grant program, schools contract with the LCHD and designate a school liaison. Staff and liaisons promote SRTS activities, implement a supervised Walking School Bus (WSB)/bike rides to school, & coordinate educational opportunities for students. Additionally, schools that may or may not be part of the mini grant program are encouraged to participate in SRTS activities such as Internal Walk to School Day, Walk/Wheel to School Challenges & Winter Walk to School Day. Modest incentives are offered to encourage participation. *Education-* Staff collaborate with schools, libraries, Safe Kids Coalition, & community groups to provide bike/ped education through bike rodeos, WSB, & helmet safety presentations. Staff will conduct research to determine future walk/bike & driving education opportunities that will be implemented in high schools as a pilot program. *Evaluation-* Parent/student surveys are collected to help staff track program impact & identify areas of concern. School participation & coordinator activities are reported monthly. Surveys, school reports and participant feedback are used to assess & improve SRTS activities. Engineering-Staff

& schools evaluate & identify physical barriers to walking/biking & advocate for communities to make improvements. 2. This proposal will build upon current SRTS activities. Staff partner with communities/schools to implement SRTS plans. For example, staff worked with the City of La Crosse on updating their 2020 SRTS Plan. Likewise, staff co-lead Village of Holmen's SRTS Taskforce guiding implementation of their SRTS Plan. LCHD's mission is to collaboratively promote a healthy community for all people. Complete Streets legislations are enacted by the County, LAPC, Onalaska, Holmen, & West Salem, thus all support active transportation. Vision Zero & other plans demonstrate support for active transportation (see pages A-7 & A-8). As plan updates occur, staff continue to advocate for the inclusion of SRTS. The National Center for SRTS Surveys are utilized to collect concerns, student travel habits, & assist schools with audits as needed. Audits are part of SRTS plan development, combined with crash statistics, school demographics, & parent/student concerns. According to WI Community Maps, from 2019-2022 there were 124 crashes involving pedestrians and 85 crashes involving bicycles in La Crosse County. LCHD staff have successfully advocated, planned, & implemented SRTS activities for 16 years. Activities and budgets are reviewed regularly to prioritize timeliness. Staff actively research local/national SRTS programs, survey schools/students/families, host focus groups & participate in committee meetings. COVID-19 impacted progress by limiting programs from spring '20 - spring '22. Staff adapted activities in collaboration with funders to continue programs. This TAP funding is imperative to revive the program & expand partnerships. Implementation of the new/expanded activities detailed in this narrative & the implementation of funds will begin in 2027. Commitment to multimodal The LCHD has a long history of broad community support for alternative modes of transportation, as demonstrated in its inclusion & participation in local/regional transportation plans and various committees. LCHD leaders & staff participate in City of La Crosse Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee, Village of Holmen SRTS Taskforce, County Highway Safety Commission, & LAPC standing committees. Staff collaborate with the County Highway Commissioner, local governments' engineers & planners, school officials, and others to address county-wide SRTS concerns and identify bike/ped accommodations on projects. 4. School policies that implement WSB's greatly enhance active

transportation. Local student travel surveys show increases in walking on WSB days. Safety problems are addressed when schools & coordinators advocate for infrastructure improvements, engage with law enforcement, & educate youth on safe walking/biking. Typical concerns are traffic volume & speed, distance, & safety of intersections/crossings. This funding will help address concerns by identifying safer alternative routes on low speed/volume streets with sidewalks, convenient WSB drop-off points for families who live further, & routes with crosswalks & crossing guards. As communities work to improve SRTS networks, bussing & car transportation may be reduced to positively impact our health & environment. Communities will experience the benefits of SRTS participation, as students become more confident in their ability to walk/bike safely. Law enforcement is supportive & participate in SRTS activities. Additional ways law enforcement can be actively involved in SRTS is being explored through focus groups & partner meetings. 5. Environmental benefits include reduced vehicle emissions, improving air quality & livability. Livability is further enhanced from added opportunities for student social connections & healthy activities. *Economic Justice*- Staff work with schools/community groups to provide bike helmets/locks & education at no charge. SRTS offers scooters & other accommodations for students without a bike. SRTS improvements benefit public health at its core, addressing safety concerns with reduced bike/ped accidents, encouraging spending time outdoors, & increasing physical activity opportunities for students. *Historical preservation benefits* include the opportunity to maintain neighborhoods by reducing the need to build additional roadways. *Economic Development benefits* include a reduced cost of transporting children to/from school. Improved Safety benefits occur with safe infrastructure improvements and increased preference for biking and walking to school. WSB/bike trains allow students to travel in supervised groups and learn ways to safely navigate their community.

RE: AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR STATE FUNDING FOR THE COUNTY-WIDE SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR FISCAL YEARS 2026 THROUGH 2028.

WHEREAS, national youth obesity rates have increased to 42% and adult obesity rates have increased to 37%* and obesity contributes to increased development of chronic disease and lowered life expectancy; and,

WHEREAS, the La Crosse County Safe Routes to School Program increases physical activity among K-8th grade children & families by encouraging safe and active commuting to and from school; and the program is expanding active transportation to and from school with students K-12th grade, and

WHEREAS, the La Crosse County Safe Routes to School Program and partner organizations including public and private school districts and communities, (La Crosse, Onalaska, Holmen, West Salem and Bangor), Gundersen Health System, Urban Connections, the Wisconsin Bike Fed, seven law enforcement agencies and community groups such as the Safe Kids Coalition of the Coulee Region, the Holmen Safe Routes to School Task Force, positively impacted approximately 8,000 students and their families prior to pandemic program interruption; and,

WHEREAS, from 2007 to 2023, approximately \$1,100,000 in grant funding was awarded to La Crosse County from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Safe Routes to School grant program for implementation of Safe Routes to School non-infrastructure activities, and

WHEREAS, current grant funding for Safe Routes to School non-infrastructure activities will sustain the program from 2023 through mid 2026 in the amount of \$447,299 through the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Transportation Alternative Program (TAP), with a required 20% match;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board of Supervisors hereby supports the La Crosse County Transportation Alternatives Program's application for state funding in the amount of \$402,598 (with a required 20% match of \$100,649) for state fiscal years 2026, 2027, and 2028 in order to continue providing this service to schools, children and families in La Crosse County.

FISCAL NOTE: Acceptance of this grant will require a 20% total match of \$100,649 to be levied across the 2026, 2027 and 2028 budgets. The personnel and operating costs related to this ongoing grant are tracked under division 200.300.3583 within the County financial system under the Chronic Disease & Injury Prevention section of the Health Department.
